Let us start with a quiz question. Which invention do you think it was that the famous women's rights activist Susan B. Anthony was referring to when she said, it "has done more to emancipate women than anything else in the world"? Anthony, from New York state in the United States, died nearly 120 years ago, but there is a high probability that you have one of these items today, and a good chance that you use it regularly. Can you guess? The answer, to give its full name, is the "safety bicycle." It was invented and produced by an Englishman called John Kemp Starley in 1885.

Before the safety bicycle, people used a different kind of bicycle called the "penny-farthing" which had limited appeal as it was difficult to ride and was not so safe. This type of bicycle had a very large front wheel and a small back wheel, which made it difficult to balance. The penny-farthing was especially unsafe for women who wore long skirts and dresses. Riding such bicycles was not socially acceptable for women because it was considered improper and dangerous. In contrast, the safety bicycle had two wheels of the same size, making it much easier to balance. This new design was safer and more comfortable, which allowed women to ride with confidence.

In the late 19th century, society still placed many restrictions on women. They were expected to stay at home, take care of the family, and follow strict rules of behavior. However, the safety bicycle gave women new freedom. It allowed them to move independently and brought changes in many areas of their lives, including fashion, social roles, and even the fight for equal rights.

The bicycle gave women a sense of (I) _____ and freedom that they had never experienced before. Before bicycles, women mostly relied on men for transportation.

They needed a man to drive them in a carriage or ride with them on horseback. The safety bicycle changed this because it was (II) _____ and easy to ride. For the first time, women could (III) _____ alone or with other women. They could visit friends, go to work, or explore their town or city without needing a man to (IV) _____ them.

This independence was a key factor in women starting to feel more (V)______ to men.

The safety bicycle also brought changes in women's fashion. At the time, women wore long, heavy skirts and tight corsets, which made it difficult to move freely. These clothes were not practical for riding bicycles. As more women started cycling, they began to wear more practical clothing like bloomers—loose trousers that allowed for easier movement. They were already popular among women's rights activitists, and although some people criticized women for wearing bloomers, they became more accepted. The change in fashion gave women more comfort and allowed them to participate in physical activities, which was another step toward equality.

The bicycle also played an important role in women's social lives. Cycling became a popular hobby for both men and women, and it allowed them to socialize together (i)______ public. Before, women's social interactions were often limited (ii)______ the home or controlled (iii)_____ men. The bicycle gave them the opportunity to make friends (iv)_____ the home and join cycling clubs, where they could meet other women and even men in a more equal setting. This change helped break down some (v)_____ the social barriers between men and women, which was important for the women's rights movement. This was led in the United States by Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton. They supported the bicycle because they realized the significance of it (vi)_____ a tool for women's liberation. It was not long before she died, aged 86, that Anthony made her comment about the importance of the bicycle for women.

Riding a bicycle gave women a feeling of empowerment, and it became a symbol of freedom and progress. Many women who supported the bicycle were also involved in the fight for women's suffrage, or the right to vote. The bicycle helped them feel stronger and more confident in their fight for equal rights.

The impact of the safety bicycle on women's liberation is also seen in the growing number of women who entered the workforce during this time. Before bicycles, many women had limited job opportunities because they could not travel far from their homes. However, with the ability to cycle to work, more women were able to take jobs outside the home, including in factories, offices, and shops. This change gave women greater financial independence and allowed them to contribute to their families and communities in new ways.
